"These Dreams of You"

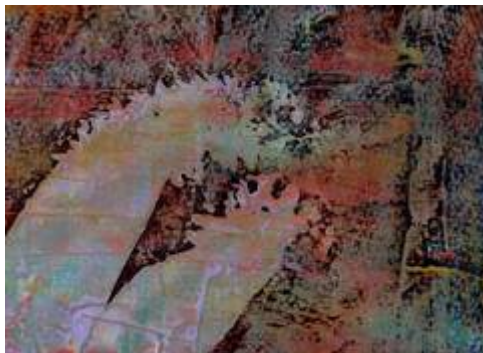
Gary Honig

Many hours have been spent; hand on the brush, pushing paint. Gary Honig found a confidence in taking on projects he sometimes knew nothing about. Years of watching how the paint reacts, the act of laying down layers of paint on surfaces has become an endless fascination. When the artist was introduced to the notion that there are no rules, it opened up endless possibilities. For him, the concept of pursuing a public venue has been a very slow metamorphosis. This show is all new work created just for this exhibition.

From his past experience as a painting contractor, Mr. Honig has been developing as an artist in the Washington D.C. area since 1990. Interested in creating his own variation of the preservation of painting language, his body of work has developed over the years.



In many ways Honig has been watching his surroundings at a crossroads, which provides an influential foundation. Personal, business, world events, global stress impinges on the creative process of an artist. Having been painting for a while, he wanted to see what it would feel like as a natural progression in terms of issues to overcome, hurdles to navigate, where does the synthesis take him, where is his evolvment.
